I believe in the United States of America as a government of the people, by the people, for the people; whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed, a democracy in a republic, a sovereign Nation of many sovereign States; a perfect union, one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice, and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes.

I therefore believe it is my duty to my country to love it, to support its Constitution, to obey its laws, to respect its flag, and to defend it against all enemies.

—Written 1917, accepted by the United States House of Representatives on April 3, 1918.

MARINE CORPS HISTORY AND TRADITIONS

- 1) The three parts of the Marine Corps Emblem and what they stand for. The eagle stands for air service, the globe for land service, and the anchor for sea service.
- 2) What Semper Fidelis means. "Always Faithful".
- 3) What the term Leatherneck means. The fact that United States Marines wore a black leather stock, or collar, from 1798 to 1880 may have given rise to the name. According to tradition, the stock was originally worn to protect the jugular vein from a slash of a saber or cutlass. However, official records fail to bear this out.
- 4) The birthdate and location of the Marine Corps. The birthdate of the Marine Corps is November 10th, 1775. Location was Tun Tavern Phila. PA.
- 5) Who the "Grand Old Man" of the Marine Corps is. Colonel Archibald Henderson. Colonel Henderson was to become known as the "Grand Old Man" of the Marine Corps after serving as its 5th Commandant from 1820 to 1859. He held this post for 39 years.
- 6) What the term Teufel Hunde means and where it originates. During the battle of Belleau Wood, Marines fought with such ferocity that the Germans in

their official reports referred to them as “Teufel Hunde” (devil-dogs).

7) Who Major Alfred A Cunningham is and what he contributed to the Marine Corps. Major Alfred A. Cunningham is known as the first Marine Corps Aviator or “The Father of USMC Aviation”.

8) Where Mount Suribachi is and its significance to the Marine Corps. Iwo Jima Japan. Iwo Jima is the sight of the most famous Marine flag raising.

9) Who the first enlisted Woman Marine is. The first enlisted Woman Marine was Opha Mae Johnson.

10) Who the first Commandant of the Marine Corps is. Captain Samuel Nicholas

CUSTOMS AND COURTESY

The Young Marine PFC must know:

1) How to properly perform the Hand Salute

2) When not to salute. Young Marines do not salute indoors unless otherwise directed by the unit commander.

3) How to properly address other Young Marines. Address the more senior Young Marine by rank or rank and last name then state your business. When the conversation is ended, Say thank you and return to your business.

4) How to properly address all adults. Address the adult leader by their appropriate title Mr./Mrs./Miss/Ms./Dr./Officer/Detective/Instructor, etc. and their last name, or “sir”/“ma’am” if you do not know their title. If the adult leader is on active duty or in the reserves or retired from the armed forces and their military rank is known, all Young Marines will address them by rank and last name.

5) What to do when the National anthem is played. Rendering Honors to the National Colors and National Anthem. Young Marines in and out of uniform will always come to their feet and stand at attention for the United States Flag and/or the National Anthem. In Uniform. If outdoors, The Young Marine will stand at Attention and render the proper hand salute until the Flag is six paces past the Young Marine. If indoors, the Young Marine, if uncovered, will stand at Attention until the Flag pass six paces beyond. If covered, by direction, the Young Marine will salute. Out of Uniform. The Young Marine will stand at Attention until the Flag is six paces past the Young Marine. The Young Marine will place the right hand over their heart. If the Young Marine is wearing a cap, the Young Marine will remove the cap from their head with their right hand and place the cap over heart

6) What is the National Ensign. When the American Flag is flown aboard ship it is know as the National Ensign

7) The date of Flag Day. June 14th

8) Who wrote the Star-Spangled-Banner. Francis Scott Key

9) The only two flags that can be flown above the American Flag. United Nation Flag and a church flag

10) What the Congressional Act of 1954 is. In 1954, Congress after a campaign by the Knights of Columbus, added the words, “under God,” to the Pledge.

11) Where does the National Colors belong in a Color guard? **Always to the right of all other Carried flags**

12) What is the Name of the First U.S. Flag? **Grand Union flag, the Congress flag, the Continental Colors**

UNIFORM AND PERSONAL APPEARANCE

The Young Marine PFC must know:

1. How to wear the Young Marine breast pocket patch. **Worn with Young Marine breast pocket patch centered above the left breast pocket, 1/8-inch above the pocket**
2. Where the nametape is worn on the shirt and trousers. **Nametapes will be sewn over the right rear pocket of the trousers, centered and flush over the top seam**
3. How ribbons are worn on the uniform. **Ribbons are worn so that the lowest row of ribbons is 1/8-inch above the left breast pocket patch and centered**
4. (MALES) How Young Marine males wear their hair. **Hair will be short enough so that it does not touch the ears or hang on the nape of the neck**
5. (FEMALES) How Young Marine females wear their hair. **Hair may touch the collar, but will not fall below the collar's lower edge. Hair that would fall naturally below the collar's lower edge will be neatly and inconspicuously fastened or pinned.**
6. What jewelry is permitted in uniform. **The only jewelry permitted is watches, medical items, religious medallions, class or Young Marines ring. All jewelry will be removed for physical training activities.**
7. Where to mark T-shirts **inside back collar**
8. Where to mark covers. **Inside on the sweatband.**
9. Where to mark boots. **Shoes/Boots. Inside near the top.**

YM Staff Sergeant (3 Stripes w/ crossed rifles and 1 rocker)

YM Gunnery Sergeant (3 Stripes w/ crossed rifles and 2 rockers)

Advance YM RANK

YM Master Sergeant (3 Stripes with crossed rifles and 3 rockers)

YM Master Gunnery Sergeant (3 Stripes with bursting bomb 4 rockers)

YM First Sergeant (3 Stripes with Diamond and 3 rockers)

YM Sergeant Major (3 Stripes with star and 4 rockers)

- 2) What the one enlisted rank in the Marine Corps that the Young Marines do not have and explain what it looks like. **Sergeant Major Of the Marine corps. The Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps has an Eagle, Globe, Anchor in the place of his star on his rank insignia**

- 1) Who is the Division Commander? **Mr. George Biedenbender**
- 2) Who the Director Of the Young Marines program? **Mr. Mike Kessler**
- 3) Who the Unit Commander is. **Mr. William Molitor**
- 4) What a Squad is. **A squad is a group of individuals formed for the purpose of instruction, The SQD has not more than eight (8) Young Marines.**
- 5) What a Platoon is. **The Platoon has not more than twenty-five (25) Young Marines**
- 6) The duties of the Sergeant of the Guard. **The Young Marine Color Sergeant is the senior Sergeant on the color guard.**
- 7) Team Leader Duties. **As a Young Marine team leader, your responsibility is to the members of your team. You are responsible for their safety and training. Additionally, you must ensure your team is well informed.**

- 3) What a command of execution is. **The command of execution is the command that tells you to do it.**

- 1) What does the Acronym C.O.L.D. stand for? **Clean Clothes, avoid Overheating, loose clothing, stay dry**
- 2) There are nine personal equipment items that should be carried in your pocket while camping in the field name 3 of them? **Whistle, Pocket Knife, Personal ID, Map & Compass, Matches, Small Survival kit, Lip Balm, Notepad and Pencil, Small Flashlight.**

Blue—is used for water or permanent ice features (like rivers, lakes, swamps and ice fields), names of water features, and the grid lines;
Green—is used for vegetation features like woods, orchards and vineyards;
Black—is used for cultural features (buildings, railways, transmission lines, etc.), toponymy (place names), some symbols and precise elevations.

- 3) Should the use of a tourniquet be part of basic first aid in the control of bleeding? **The answer to that should most likely be no. The only time a tourniquet should be used in a first aid situation is in the case of a major injury such as a severed limb.**
